Procedural Reform: Involves changes in financial rules, alteration of work procedures

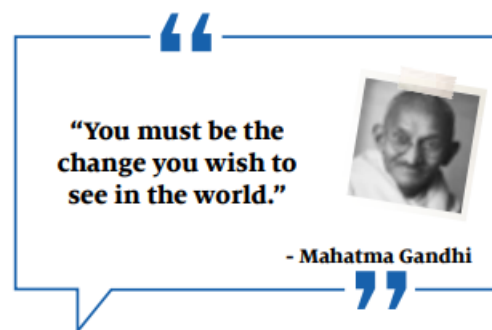
(e.g. changes in filing methods, forms etc.), and other general attempts to avoid red tape.
